#### We Are Change Capable by Vina Dungo-Cursillo Proper Chairperson - Women



Major change happens moment to moment. We need to re-wire ourselves to be more comfortable with and open to change; we need to become more change-capable. Increase in understanding, clarifying and reinforcing priorities, giving control and priorities are ways to help people change in a

positive way.

We understand that hesitation around change is normal — rather than assuming that people are "change-resistant" or "negative" — and support people through the necessary mindset shift, it'll be much better if we build a critical mass of people who will understand, accept, and adopt the change reasonably quickly. More importantly, it will help people to become more change-capable and to have habits of mind to approach change in a more neutral and open way.

Last September, during the class of Rectora Linda Pascual, in obedience, we started implementing most if not almost all of the changes based on the "Step-By-Step" Rector's Manual presented to us by the National Cursillo.

Below is the summary of the changes we are implementing during the Cursillo Weekend and some terms we need to get familiar with:

- When we JUMP we say, "Table Group of "St Cecilia, for instance instead of "Decuria" of St Cecilia
- Way of the Cross –to be led by the Rector/a Vice Rector/a
- After Piety rollo instead of Challenge, it is now called Intervention
- <u>New Cursillistas</u> new term for Candidates and <u>Table Head</u> – new term for President of the Decuria
- No more taking of watches and cell phones from the New Cursillistas
- Thursday Dinner there will be "Bankruptcy" reading by the Dean of Piety
- Friday Mass Prayers of the Faithful to be read by the Rector/a
- Corridor Work (after Rollo No. 6 (Study) -The Deans of each Department mingle with the New Cursillistas during lunch and dinner, to get to know them and interact with them.

- When introducing the Rollista, The Rector/a simply states: "The next Rollo is given by..." This is repeated before every Rollo.
- On Friday, after Rector/a's talk, PROFESSOR COOK will be read by the Rector/a before Rollo 1 -Ideal.
- Explain the use of Hobbies Sheet (to be distributed after Rollo 1- Ideal)
- Visit to the Blessed Sacrament every after the Staff Meeting, every night.
- "Special Lunch" instead of "Agape"
- No more procession of Mama Mary on Saturday, only Singing and Offering of Flowers
- Sunday Mass, Dean of Piety assigns staff or auxiliaries to read the First Reading, Responsorial Psalm (if Music group won't be singing) and Second Reading. Rector/a or Vice Rector/a will read the Prayers of the Faithful.
- Clausura there will be singing of De Colores song as the New Cursillistas process in the church. Action team will line them up, with the Rector/a, Vice Rector/a, Cursillo Proper, Priest/s or Deacon/s.
- Quadrant Sheet to be distributed during the Staff Meeting on Thursday
- NO more reading of Palanca love letters from Family Members by Clergy Rollista. Rector/a will explain the meaning of Palanca and he/ she will read some of them.

#### CLAUSURA

After the sharing by the New Cursillistas, we invite the "distinguished visitors" or one of the Staff, to speak, whom we know can encourage the new Cursillistas.

- We end the Clausura with the Lord's Prayer which we offer for three intentions:
  - 1. To give thanks for the spiritual and apostolic success of the weekend.
  - 2. For those who have prayed and made sacrifices for the success of the weekend.
  - 3. For the success of the next Cursillo weekend.

Then we applaud to the Lord present in the Blessed Sacrament and we sing "De Colores".

## A Holyland Pilgrimage Should be on top of a Catholic's Bucket List

My siblings and I together with our better halves, (less one) just returned from a Holyland Pilgrim-

age to Israel and Jordan from February 28 to March 8 just as Lent started five days previous. We signed up with Chaplet Tours and Pilgrimages out of Buena Park originally for March, 2020 but the Covid-19 pandemic put everything on hold including our tour. But this year, with Tour Manager Chris Basilio from Chaplet and Shepherd Rev. Fr. Mauricio "Mau" Goloran, 'all systems are go'.

Our party: Rod, Class 610 with wife Gisela, Remy Nelson, Class 32 by herself and myself, Class 31 with my wife, Lori, along with 43 fellow Pilgrims from the Los Angeles area composed mostly of Filipinos, a couple of Caucasian husbands, a lady from Indonesia and another from Vietnam boarded Lufthansa at LAX on **Day One, January 27<sup>th</sup>** for Tel Aviv via Frankfurt and on **Day Two, February28<sup>th</sup>**, arrived at Ben Gurion Airport where we were met by our Israeli native Roman Catholic guide and our bus driver. We checked -in, stowed our luggage and had dinner at our hotel, Ramada Nazareth, and bedded down for the night.

**Day Three, March 01:** after breakfast, we headed for the port city of Caesaria built by King Herod the Great, which included his palace, a Roman Theater, Aqueduct and a Gladiator Arena. Next stop was the high-tech city of Haifa and Stella Maris Monastery, both on Mt. Carmel. We headed back to Nazareth for lunch, then Eucharistic celebration at the Basilica of the Annunciation, the largest church in the region, a visit to St. Joseph's church and workshop, Mary's well, then dinner back at our hotel, a short 'wedding rehearsal' and retired for the night.

**Day Four, March 02:** After breakfast, first stop, Cana, Galilee, at the church marking the spot of Jesus' first Miracle. Eleven and-a-half couples (the other half in California via facetime) renewed wedding vows, from as little as 15 years to as much as 44 years of marriage. Next stop the Sea of Galilee and the Ministry Sites also known as "The Gospel Triangle". Seaside lunch of "St. Peter's Fish" (Tilapia); Capernaum; Mt. of Beatitudes; The Primacy of St. Peter; Tabgha or the site of the 5,000 fed with two fish and five loaves. Then on to Magdala where an ancient church and an old Synagogue just got

unearthed and a boat ride on the Sea of Galilee. Then dinner at our hotel and bedtime.

**Day Five, March 03:** We packed our bags the night before and left them early at the hotel lobby for loading in our bus. After breakfast, on to Mt. Tabor, mount of Transfiguration, above the Valley of Megiddo (Armageddon) for morning Eucharistic Celebration. Then south to Jericho, the oldest city in the world and the baptismal site of Jesus and renewed our Baptism Rites with water from the Jordan River, albeit a little murky. Drove to the Mountain of Temptation where Jesus spent 40 days and 40 nights amidst temptations from the Devil. Lunch at Jericho and then on to Bethlehem where the rest of the day was spent shopping before heading for Jerusalem and checking-in to our new Grand Court Hotel.

Day Six, March 04: After breakfast we visited the Church of the Assumption but due to construction inside, we were not able to enter. Then to the Garden of Gethsemane, at the Grotto, and Eucharistic Celebration at the Church of All Nations as we gathered around the Altar over the 'Rock of Agony' where Jesus shed sweat and blood. Then climbed up the Mount of Olives, enjoyed the view of the walled city, Mt. Zion and the modern Jerusalem on the horizon. Had a group photo with everyone in the entourage taken overlooking the walled city. More churches: Pater Noster Church where the Lord's Prayer was first invoked; Chapel of the Ascension where we kissed the rock last stepped on by Jesus here on Earth. Then on to Dominus Flevit and St. Magdalene Church, St. Peter in Gallicantu, site of four ancient churches and the house of Caiaphas where Peter denied Jesus three times. Then back to the hotel for dinner and bedtime.

**Day Seven, March 05:** Entering the Jewish Quarter of the walled City through the "Dung Gate" and stuck prayers and petitions between cracks and gaps in the rocks of the "Wailing Wall" portion of the Western Wall of the Temple, with The Dome of the Rock Mosque right above. Then on to Shepherds' Field where the Angels Announced the Holy Birth to those tending their flock and had Mass inside a cave chapel used to keep flocks safe for the night in Biblical Times. A visit to the Church of the Nativity where Jesus was born followed, then to Ein Karem, home of Elizabeth and Zechariah where John the Baptist Con't to page 13

was born and the Church of the Visitation.

Day Eight, March 06: Left our packed bags at the lobby and at 4:00 AM, entered the walled city's Lion's Gate through the Muslim Quarter and traced the Stations of the Cross along "Via Dolorosa" Then to the Church of the Holy Sepulchre in the Christian Quarter and finished the 14<sup>th</sup> Station at the Rock of Golgotha, a spot under a rock where Jesus laid for three days is kept. Then back to our hotel for breakfast. After breakfast, entered the Sheep's Gate to St. Anne's Church, birthplace of the Virgin Mary, near the pool of Bethesda. 
**Day Ten, March 08:** Breakfast is always great at the Holiday Inn Dead Sea. Then off to Mount Nebo, stayed at the summit and saw what Moses may have seen of "The Promised Land", but was not allowed to set foot on. After Eucharistic Celebration, we visited a famous workshop specializing in colorful stone mosaic artwork, household utensils, paraphernalia and jewelry. At our hotel, last call for Dead Sea dipping; a special room was set up for our group for our final get-together: our "Secret Prayer Partner" reveal. Each of us was given a name of a secret prayer partner and all throughout the Pilgrimage, we would pray for that person, and that person would in turn pray for his or her prayer partner. There was a huge receptacle where passengers discarded clothing, personal effects, even whole suitcases since they were overladen. We just prayed for the best. At Frankfurt, all went well; same as at LAX, and back at the Flyaway Station in Van Nuys where we boarded our Uber ride for home, sweet home.

Now as a Filipino Roman Catholic and a Cursillista, I highly encourage our brothers and sisters in Christ to join these Holyland Pilgrimages before embarking on other Holy destinations; I am sure many of our members have already done it, even more than once, several times over. It is an eye-opening experience that sheds light on our religious practices and why we do them. 
